		the time difference sleep and your other responsibilities? Neeca?
Neeca:	02:26	So first of all, I'm a very nocturnal person, so I prefer working at night and I genital like working me working during those time because for me it's important to have that real time commuNeecation with Jen so that she could answer my questions right away that I don't have to wait for 12 RS so I could do the work because I get stuck if I, there's questions that weren't answered. So with the time difference, for me it's okay because yeah, with my choice of working during the night and then with my sleep it's totally fine. I sleep at around sometimes 4:00 AM and slip in the morning and then I wake off, take my launch and do some errands and household tours. So that's my daily routine.

Neeca:	03:30	Actually no, they work during daytime because some of, mostly of my virtual assistant friends is, they're working for your own Australian clients. So the time difference is just like three hours to ours. So they work during the day. So yeah, we just hung out during the weekends.
Jen Lehner:	03:49	Speaking of a weekend. So you're, you're a young person with a social life. Um, how are you able to juggle your social life and um, all of the many tasks and obligations you have at gen laner media?
Neeca:	04:04	I still have a pretty active social life because, you know, with my work I could work anywhere. So sometimes during weekdays there are dinner parties that I need to attend to like very a special person, say my relative, then it's okay that I could spend time with them and then afterwards then I could just work anywhere. So yeah, that's it.



Jen Lehner:	04:31	So we've got some questions, several questions from Krista Viegler okay. So we're just, I'm going to run down the list here. So crystal wants to know what in the world makes you so dedicated.
Neeca:	04:44	Oh, thank you for, for saying that. It's really that I really love my job because when I work and I know that I got to help Jen and all our clients, it really makes me work harder even more because I just, when I realized, Oh, this, even with a very short tutorial or a small thing that I've got to send to our clients and it made their day, that really encouraged me to do more and to really do better. Like I know that I could do better. What drives me to become more dedicated.
Jen Lehner:	05:28	Yeah. I think what I'm hearing you say is that it's meaningful to you to help the people in our community, like you get satisfaction from helping people. I also noticed the like and I wished it wouldn't have taken like three years for me to learn this about you. Maybe. Maybe it was like two and a half years, but you remember when you made that video for the, for the, for VIP live
Neeca:	05:52	yeah. Yeah. The video.
Jen Lehner:	05:53	We were having our live retreat and just before I left, it was out of town in Charleston and I was busy packing up and then it occurred to me, Oh, I wish we could do like a montage video of how far everybody's come and like to cry to grab everybody's introductory video videos because when people join front row VIP, they usually make what we call a a hashtag new kid video. And uh, they introduce themselves to the community, tell a little bit about their business and so forth and, and so all these people who are coming to front row coming to VIP live this retreat, they had these new kid videos and I was like, Aw man, Neeca, I wish I would have done a video, like montage of everybody sort of like in the early days. And she's like, well, why don't you let me do it?

It was like really well produced, but more importantly like what I saw in the way that you put it all together was that you really knew our members. Jen Lehner: 07:24	The other thing that I noticed was that I wished we would have done sooner is sort of bringing you to the forefront sooner. Like, because when you started going live and started showing up an answer, answering people's questions directly, doing tutorial videos and really doing more of that, I could see that like you're really good at that. And I could see that, that you enjoyed it because it was a way of helping and people really like appreciated it so much. Then she goes on to ask, what was your story before you landed here with me?
Neeca: 07:59	Okay. So I was looking for an online job because, uh, before I was working with a VA agency here in our SAP and I resigned and I was looking because I want to work at home. So I look for a job and online jobs and then I got to see Jen's job posting and it really resonates with me because with all the description and the tools that she posted there and I was kind of confident that I could do it. So I applied and I think after a couple of days she got back to me and we had an interview during December and I started and luckily I got hired and then I started in January 8th

Um, well you are at a VA. So you were at like a V a a company where there's like a bunch of VA's at one place. Like you



		show up at the center and then your clients are kind of randomly assigned to you and maybe you have multiple clients. Is that how that works?
Neeca:	09:14	No, I have a one client only. So they match my skills with a specific lie on that needs my skills
Jen Lehner:	09:25	and then, but then you work directly with them, not through the agency. Like you, you had direct contact with your employer. Okay. Yep. Chrissa also wants to know, Chris has some really good questions. She wanted to know what the biggest mistakes you see when people here are trying to hire VA's in the Philippines.
Neeca:	09:48	I think the biggest mistake that I see is that they're looking for someone that is already scaled, that knows all the tools that they know. And for me that is kind of, there's a mistake on that part because they could hire someone that doesn't have all the knowledge of all the tools that they use because with the systems that we do, like for example, I don't know Kajabi, I don't know Squarespace at the beginning, but you just showed me one like one or two couple of videos. Then I learned from there and you know, I do those processes and that's how I get the master, all the tools. So from all for all those people that's going to hire, don't look for someone that is already skilled, but look for someone that really has that potential to be your partner.
Jen Lehner:	10:45	Yeah, I love that. That's so true. Because you know, typically what will happen is people will put in the job posts. I want someone who knows how to use click funnels and do WordPress and also convert kit and like all the things and they'll list out all their software. And number one, it's very, I mean very unlikely that you're going to find one person that that is like a Ninja and all those things, but more importantly like I love that. So we use Kajabi. It's the best all in one solution for all online entrepreneurs. I got to put it in a shout out for Kajabi. We love Kajabi around here, but neither one of us really knew. We didn't know how to use Kajabi when I signed up



for Kajabi, one thing I knew for sure was that I wanted Neeca to be completely in charge of that.

Jen Lehner: 11:30 I wanted to be able to say, I've got a great idea for a course, so I'm going to, or a freebie. So could you please put together a pipeline and do an opt in page and some follow up emails and and a landing page and all those things. It. Can you make sure, I don't even have to say make sure and tag everybody a certain kind of way because Nick already knows how to do that. But there were trainings on Kajabi and most good software platforms between that and YouTube and courses that you could buy very inexpensively on Udemy or Coursera, those kinds of places, Skillshare. Then you can give those trainings to any competent VA who can learn and become the expert in that for you. You don't have to know all the things and you don't have to have hire someone who already knows it. Jen Lehner: 12:16 It's more important to hire someone who really has the desire and the potential to learn. So I'm so glad you said that Nico, cause that's, that's so true. One of the mistakes I see when people try to hire from the Philippines or from anywhere really is that they're not exactly sure where to start. I think that in our course, front row CEO that I think that's one of the things people like so much is that they're able to go through it step by step. They don't really have to think. It's just super plug and play because it's, um, it's a really, it's, it's overwhelming in our course, front row CEO, we offer as a graduation bonus, a special course that is for your new VA because the idea is that you go through the program at the end, you've hired your perfect match virtual assistant, and so we gift you with this course that is actually a course that you give to them and it really addresses a lot of the, I don't know, like topics. You're not going to deeper topics, a more sensitive topics that you're not going to really find anywhere else. And we interviewed, let me correct that. You interviewed people, virtual assistants in the Philippines and asked them some tough guestions. And one of them was about that Krista is pointing out, she says from the course, one of the most



		helpful things for me to know was that Filipino VA's are non-confrontational, but they might disappear if they're unhappy. And I think it was Febby who had talked about that can, can you elaborate on that?
Neeca:	13:52	It's in our nature that we really are not nonconfrontational because we tend to say I'm okay. Yes, we always just like agree and do our job. When clients or our employers confront us with things, we sometimes don't know how to react or sometimes some people like they might take it personally, but you know, obviously we shouldn't, but then it's not usual to us. Like we still are adjusting to that because it's kind of off. But you know, we just have to really understand that it's in your nature that sometimes you're just very straightforward and you've got to get to the point right away.
Jen Lehner:	14:39	So what I'm hearing you say is that it's in our nature, so like we as Americans tend to be sort of more blunt and direct and we get to it right away. But in the culture in the Philippines, it's a little more, it's non-confrontational, so people aren't so like direct and in your face about stuff. And when that happens, it might feel, I don't know, scary. Right. And so because I do here for people who say, Hey, I tried to hire in the Philippines and I thought I had someone that I thought things were going okay and then they just go sit me. And so we, we talked a lot about that. You talked about that with your colleagues and brought those interviews back and I just thought that was, I thought that was so, so interesting. And that leads us into a cat searches question and cat says, how do you Neeca commuNeecate with me when you're pretty sure that what I'm asking you to do is either beyond your skills or you can't complete it within my requested timeframe.
Neeca:	15:41	I have this attitude that sometimes even I, if I don't know what you're asking is that I still look for at like search for it. So I will look for a way that I could help you because I just don't want, I don't want to say, Hey Dan, I don't know how to do that because that is just not me. Like I will, that is I will just look for Google and how there are some ways



		that I know that I could help you with or if there's any solution that I could think of and then, but if I know that it's really not going to work with me, that is just going to waste both of our time, then I'll just tell you that it's better to hire someone from Fiverr or anywhere else to do this stuff and then if I cannot finish it with a requested timeframe, then I'll just be honest that if you wanted me to create a video or something that it really required me more time because I'm not used to doing it. So yeah, I'm just, I'll just be honest with you.
Jen Lehner:	16:44	One thing I love is that, and you, you know, I never asked you to do this, but you are so good about if I ask for something or I put something on our to do list or our wishlist or whatever the assignment is, or the task is, if there's a problem, let's say you run into a problem or it's not doable, you always come back with a solution. You never say, yeah, can't do that. You know, you always, you always are like, well we ran into this roadblock, however I think we might be able to do this. And you teach this in the VA course for other VA's, which I love. That's in the front row VA course that you really say like you recommend that there's a great way to work with, with your CEO. And I love that. Okay, so Patty linen wants to know what it's really like to work with me and it's like, what are you going to say? Like you're on, you're on this podcast. And I'm like, you know, um, Oh, I just really can't stand working with Jim. But go ahead Neeca. Yeah. Just you haven't complete amnesty right now. Like what is it really like working with, with me? The good and the bad. Seriously. You could say it.
Neeca:	17:57	Yeah. Um, I'm going to say like Jen is the best, but you know, that's given. So what I'm gonna say now is Zen is like my family. She is sometimes my mom, she is sometimes my dad, my sister, she's my sister because I can tell her anything, like whether it's like personal or work related that, and then she's like my dad because she's kept on reminding me of this thought and she's like my mom because I can always go to her. Like she's always there for me.

Neeca:	18:55	Okay. I think, eh, frisk is really reminding you of things like your day to day and your emails and like assisting you with livestream because I think that is really also very important. And then another would be me doing all of those are revenue producing stuff like uh, we know that also this live streams are very important on for our clients and assisting our clients. I know that you really emphasize that especially when we had another launch with a CEO that our priority is really helping all our clients that we get to answer all of them as early as possible. Like very prompt response.
Jen Lehner:	19:44	Yes. And that was so awesome. So when we launched front row CEO beta and we did get so much great feedback and I am very proud of that, that almost all the people who took our, the exit interviews and our exit surveys said that they were blown away by how fast we answered in the community and also within the product. Cause people, you know, ask questions underneath the lesson and one of us more often than not, it was you who would jump in there and quickly answer a question whether it was techNeecal or or about the content. And that's where the hours really came in. Very helpful because someone in Europe, it could be taking, you know, people were watching that content all around the clock so you know, if I was asleep you are awake and, and so I thought that, I thought that was great.
Jen Lehner:	20:25	I would say that for me the greatest way that you support me is, Oh my gosh, where do I even start? I would say that I love the way that you really anticipate my needs. So sometimes like it's such a joy to walk in and into the office and log into Trello and see that you have already like



		mentioned always, I've shared this story before, but we were talking about social media week and I just mentioned that we ought to do something for social media week. And I don't know, like maybe five days later I walked in and you were like, Hey Jen, take a look at the cello board. And when I did you had recorded these videos for me telling me like your plan, what you thought we should do for social media week. And it was very elaborate with in terms of like all that you were going to handle.
Jen Lehner:	21:18	But all I had to do, you had the topics mapped out for every day of what I would talk about in a live stream. So I just basically you did the slides, you did the graphics, you did everything. And I was able to show up, press a button, go live, which is what I love to do the best is teach and then press the button when I was done. And then you took care of every single thing else and I wanted to just cry. I was so elated, I blew my mind. So, and since then you've done lots of things like that. So I love that you anticipate my needs. I love that you are so helpful to our community and that you've gotten to know everybody that's just priceless. And what am I really like? One thing I really love is that I love that you handle our inbox.
Jen Lehner:	22:02	So a lot of emails that are just sort of standard questions or you know it's a customer service issue, you're able to reply to that and I don't, I don't ever have to see it or manage it. And I also love when somebody emails and they want either me to be on their podcast or they want to be on my podcast or something like that, that anything that needs to be scheduled, someone wants to have a meeting with me that I can just forward the email to them. And not only do you know like exactly how to reply, but then you also give them a link to the right, a scheduling link so then they can, and you manage my calendar so you know everything that's going on. And that has been just huge cause I really can't stand back as you know, I cannot stand back and forth with anything.
